Thomas Parker is renowned as the maker of the chapel organ for the Foundling Hospital, where Handel's *Messiah* was regularly performed during the latter half of the eighteenth century. He was apprenticed to the organ builder Richard Bridge and, according to a notice in the *Gazetteer and New Daily Advertiser* on 28 June 1774, was succeeded by John Frost. He registered Michael Woodward as an apprentice for seven years on 27 April 1767 (TNA: PRO IR 1/25, f.67) but died before its expiry date; he made his will on 8 March 1771 and it was proved on 11 May 1772 (TNA: PRO B 11/978, ff.198v–9). Unusually, the first of Parker's Sun Fire policies describes him as a maker of organs, harpsichords and spinets. He is, however, not recorded as a harpsichord maker in Boalch (1995), and no harpsichords or spinets by him are known to survive. Using the Apprenticeship Bindings in conjunction with the Sun Fire Office records his various premises were: Canon Street (c1750); Prescott Street, Goodman's Fields (c1755-8); Leadenhall Street (c1761-8); 105 Strand (c1769–75); 45 Strand (c1775); 30 Great St Helens (1770–6); and 116 Leadenhall Steet (1770–6). He made his will on 3 August 1776 and it was proved on 9 October 1776 (TNA: PRO B 11/1024, ff.199-202). According to the terms of the will, his two sons Edward (bap 22 December 1751) and John (bap 27 August 1756) were to continue the business, with Edward taking John as a partner when he reached the age of 21. Furthermore, at the time of making his will Pistor was living at 116 Leadenhall Street, his workshop was situated nearby at 30 Great St Helens and he had the use of a yard belonging to Mr Mills in Gravel Lane, Hounsditch. Despite the apparent separation of home and workshop, however, his dwelling house still contained his stock of instruments, workshop tools and timber. He was succeeded by his son Edward Pistor (ii). We are very grateful for the assistance of Jessica Collins (archivist of The Clothworkers' Company) for providing us with apprenticeship and freedom details of members of the Pistor family.

On 20 March 1737/38 Plenius signed an agreement with Charles Cope concerning his 'Invention by means of certain levers pulleys and weights which it is presumed will keep [harpsichords] constantly in tune.' While Cope would bear the cost of obtaining a patent, Plenius was required to pay Cope £15 15s for every harpsichord or gut-strung harpsichord (lyrichord) he made for the next 14 years, 20% of all money received for applying the invention to any other instrument, and allow Cope access to both his workshop and his accounts. A further agreement was made betwen the two parties on 1 January 1741/42, Cope lending Plenius the sum of £1,100; see TNA: C109/329. Two patents were granted to Plenius: no.581 (30 December 1741) for various harpsichord appliances, including the tuning device; and no. 613 (10 July 1745) for a type of buff stop. It would appear, however, that the terms of the agreements with Cope were too harsh for Plenius; he was declared bankrupt in 1756 (London Gazette, 24 July 1756) and spent a period in the Fleet prison (London Gazette, 24 March 1761). His insurance policy of this date is important since it provides evidence that he had premises in Wardour Street two years prior to his appearance in the rate books; from his 1786 insurance policy (LMA, 11936/338, policy no.522691) we know that his workshop was later situated behind his dwelling house at 99 Wardour Street. He married Alison Turnbull on 7 January 1783 (WCA, St Martin-in-the-Fields, Marriage Register 1781–5, mf 43).
